

The US Falls covered in snow & ice were amazing but the Canadian Falls were absolutely stunning! Top of the 'to do' list coming highly recommended was lunch at CN TOWER, the world's tallest tower! The glass lift (aka elevator) whizzed us up the outside of the tower to a revolving 360° restaurant in the sky. While we ate our luxurious lunch we enjoyed ever changing views of Toronto & Lake Ontario as the restaurant moved slowly round full circle before the clouds came down and blocked everything!! A glass of Champagne at Tiffany's... a meal at Hard Rock Cafe... and a visit to the Theatre to see "ONCE" on our last night was the perfect ending to our amazing 10 days in Canada
